Special Session 2021

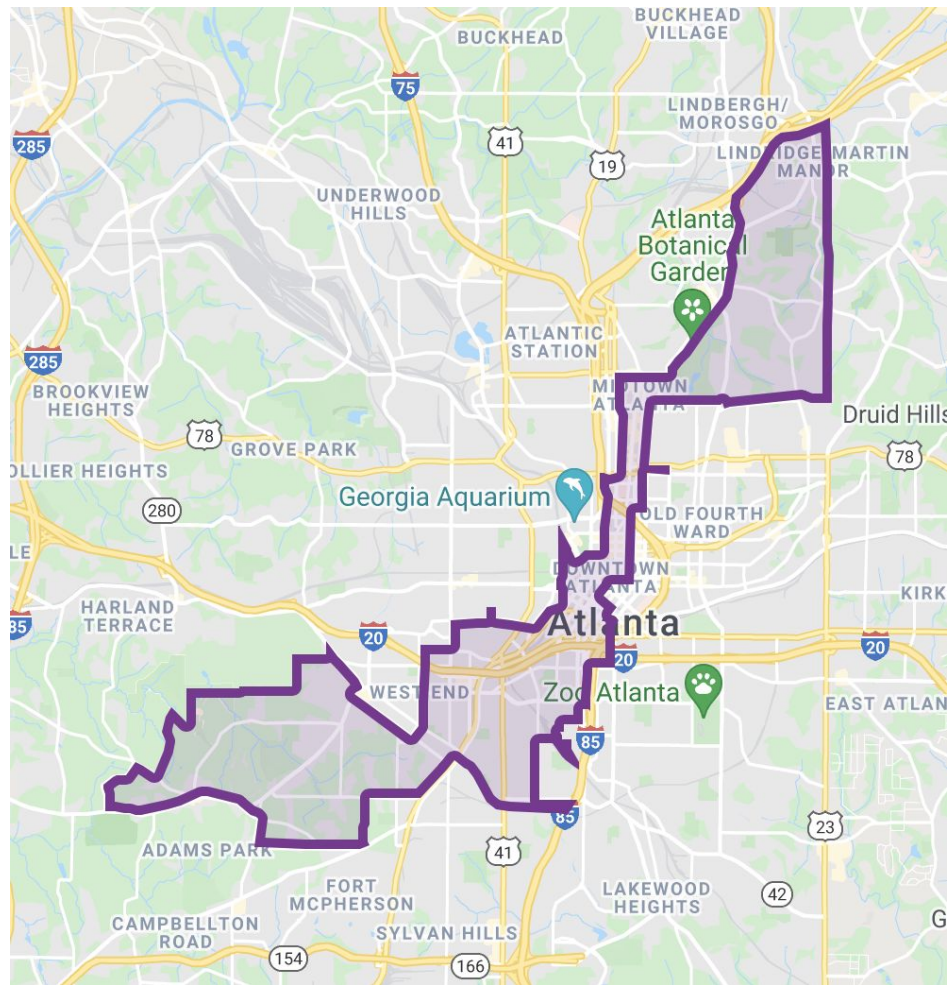
Every 10 years in America there is a Census. This is Constitutionally required so we have equal representation in every district.

After the Census data is gathered and calculated at the federal level it is released to the states so they can begin to reapportion the number of people in each district.

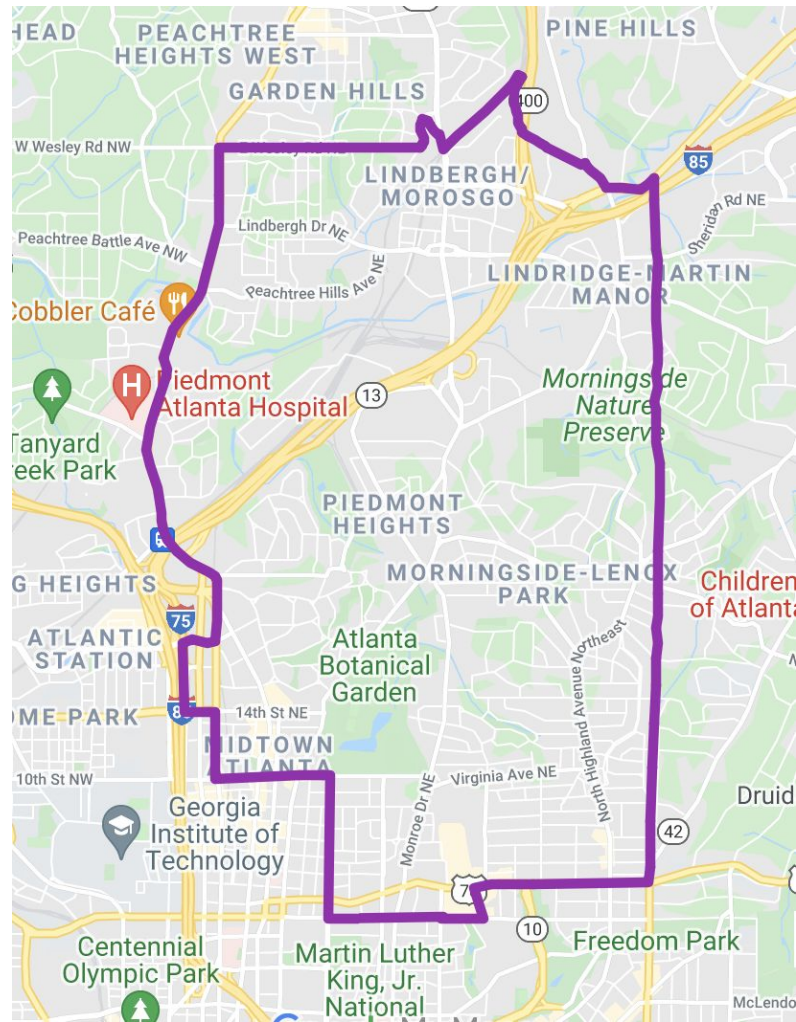
Georgia has a legislature-dominant redistricting process. This means the House and Senate draw the maps which defaults to the party in power.

During the 2021 Special Session, we passed 56 new Senate and 180 new House Districts.

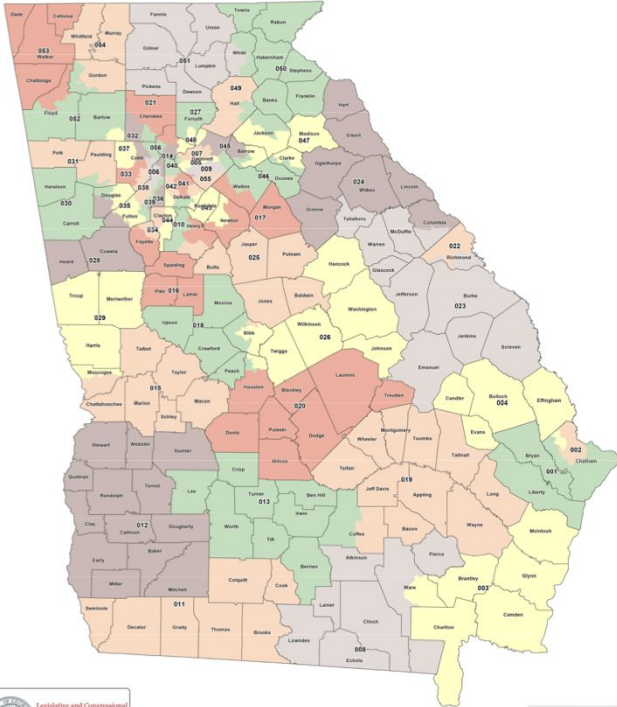

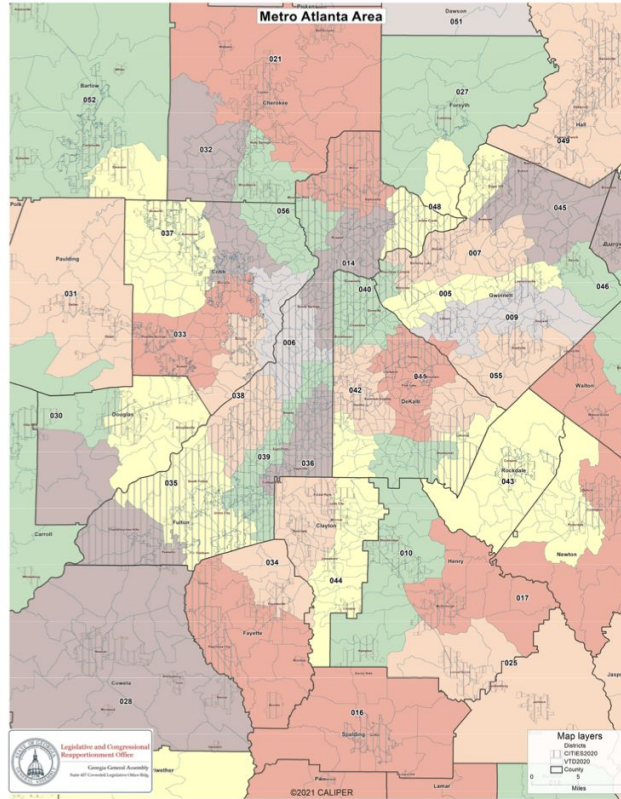

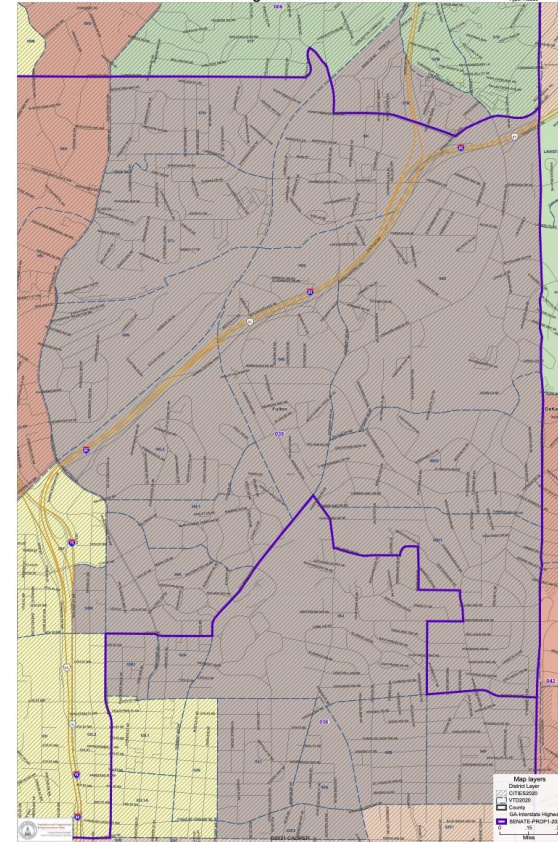

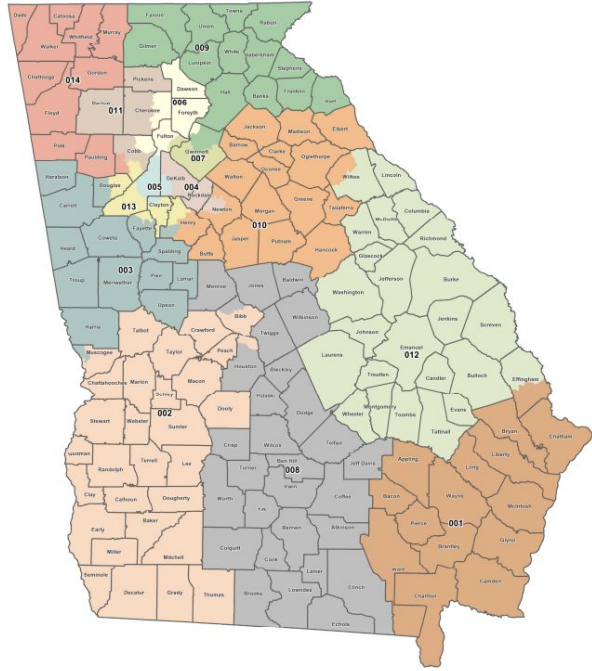

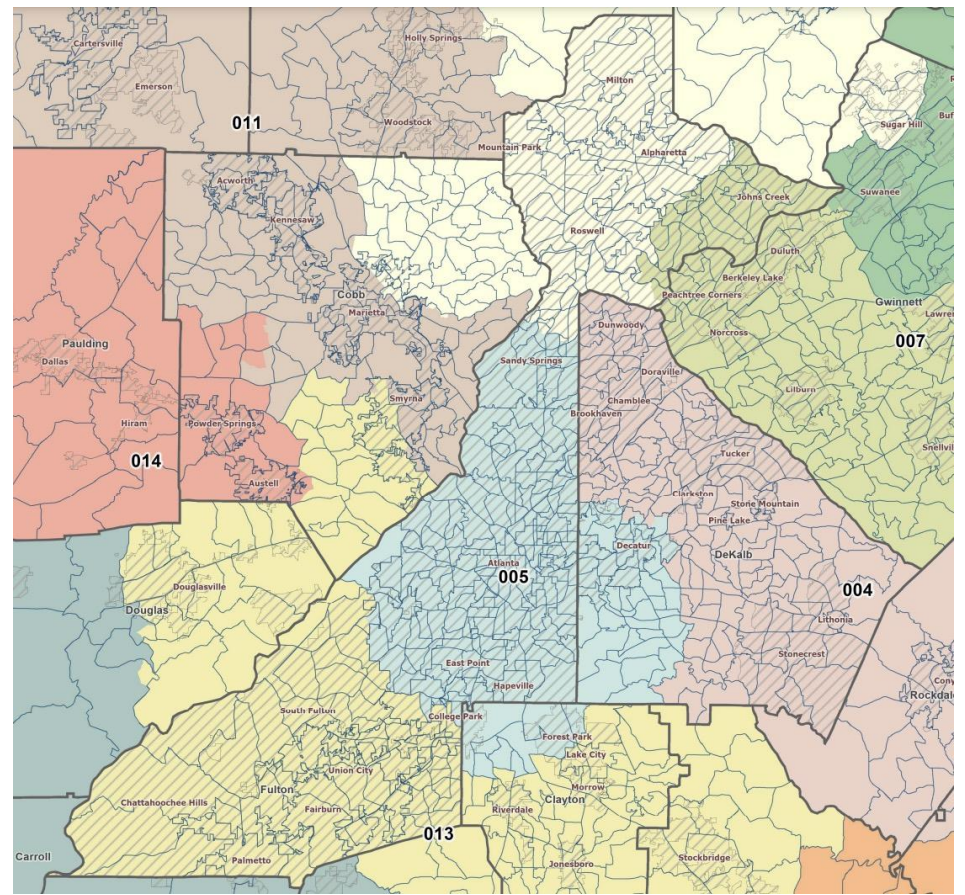
New Senate Districts-191,264 /district which is a 18,290 person increase per district.

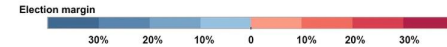


New Congressional Districts - 765,136 /district which is a 73,161 increase per district.

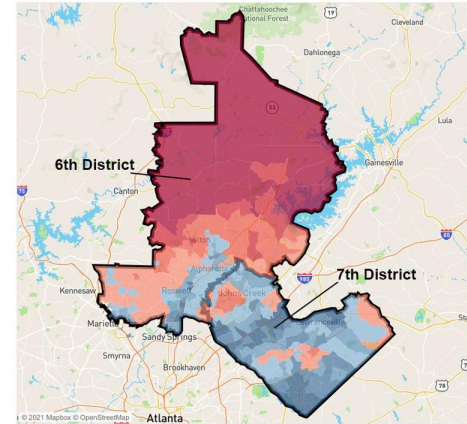
The new Congressional Maps will pit two incumbents against each other: Congresswoman Lucy McBath and Carolyn Bordeaux.

How 6th and 7th districts could change

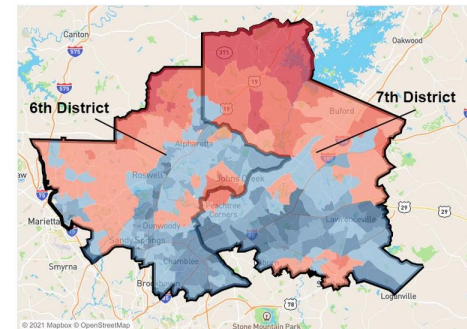
Two of the most competitive districts in the U.S. House could have solid partisan leanings. The 6th would favor Republicans by trading Democratic areas in Cobb, DeKalb and Fulton counties for solid Republican precincts in Cherokee, Dawson and Forsyth counties. The 7th would favor Democrats by losing GOP areas of Forsyth and adding Democratic parts of Gwinnett.
